TRUSTEES' ANNUAL REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 JANUARY 2019

The Trustees present their annual report together with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 January 2019. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out on pages 13 to 14 and comply with the Charities' Act 2011, the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Memorandum and Articles of Association, Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland published on 16 July 2014 and the Companies Act 2006. The report and statements also comply with the Companies Act 2006 as Thrombosis UK (Formerly known as Lifeblood: The Thrombosis Charity) was incorporated by guarantee on 16th January 2002. It has no share capital and is a registered charity (registered 12th February 2002).

OBJECTIVES AND STRATEGIES

Thrombosis UK was established to advance medical science in relation to the diagnosis, causes, prevention, alleviation, management and cure of thrombosis and for the promotion of knowledge and public education of the understanding and awareness of thrombosis. Using the powers conferred by the Memorandum of Association Thrombosis UK aims to fund:

- a range of studies looking at why and how a thrombosis occurs;
- research into the management and the improvement of current treatments available;
- an education programme that informs people about the causes, effects, prevention and recommended management of thrombosis;
- provide a network of support for those affected by thrombosis.

ORGANISATION AND STRUCTURE

Th Board of Trustees, who are also Directors of the company, govern Thrombosis UK.

The Trustees have the power to appoint, and remove any member, any member to act as Secretary to the Charity and all vote on the appointment of the Chairman, Treasurer and other Honorary Officers.

The charity seeks to ensure Trustees are appointed to fulfil the changing and on-going needs of the charity's activities and outcome. A Trustee job description was agreed when vacancies became available to ensure existing and new Trustees have clarity on their roles and they each bring skills that complement and benefit Thrombosis UK. New Trustees are appointed with the unanimous approval of existing Trustees. All Trustees give freely of their time and expertise and receive no remuneration for their work.

The day to day administration of the Charity is the responsibility of the Chief Executive Officer employed on 0.8 FTE contract. The Charity also employs an Executive Officer (full time), and Project Development Officer, on a 21 hours per week contract for the year under review.

Main areas of the Charity's work during 2018/19 have involved:

- Completion of IT systems and communications
- Extension of the Charity's website
- Accredited educational events for healthcare and allied professionals
- Development of new information resources and regional meetings for those affected by thrombosis
- Support and involvement with annual events including National Thrombosis Week (NTW) and World Thrombosis Day (WTD)
- Review and development of sustainable income streams

AIMS AND ACTIVITIES

The Charity aims to promote greater awareness and understanding of venous thromboembolism (VTE) to improve:

- Prevention of avoidable blood clots
- Earlier detection and diagnosis
- Appropriate management that improves patient outcomes
- Timely support and education to enable patients to restore their well-being and their health

To support achievement of this, the Charily concentrates on three key areas:

Awareness

Implementation of safe and appropriate data and communications systems is essential to the safe and effective operations of the Charity. Building on 2017/18 work and investment, the Charity has worked to continually review, test and improve to enable improved engagement and reach.

The Thrombosis UK website was central to expanding engagement. Responding to feedback and review, navigation has been improved, dedicated audience-specific areas developed, and new sections built.

The improved communication and website systems proved beneficial and metrics showed increase in engagement on key information sections about thrombosis and also for the launch and promotion of new a awareness initiative #StepUpToStopClots which straddled both awareness and fundraising projects and saw a first in promoting specific fundraising opportunities that resulted in signing-up fundraisers to participate in the Bath Half, Barcelona Marathon, Edinburgh running festival, walking and individual challenges. This also saw the launch of an interactive Tweet and social media live stream on the Thrombosis UK website sharing and celebrating awareness raising.

Thrombosis UK is a proud supporter of World Thrombosis Day (WTD); along with several specific activities, the charity supported media awareness of WTD via more than 20 medical, patient and carer representatives across the UK sharing their accounts and taking part in TV, press and radio interviews.

Education

With extended platforms, the Charity was able to promote six healthcare professional conferences and four patient information and support meetings as part of the annual May #LetsTalkClots awareness and education week. The 2018/19 events saw increase in registration and two new locations joining the programme – Bristol and Manchester, heading up South West and North West National Thrombosis Conferences respectively. For 2018/19, registration grew to a record high and agendas boasted internationally respected faculty supporting both patient meetings and accredited healthcare (HCP) and allied professional conferences. The Charity welcomed endorsement from leading professional bodies, NHS Trusts and World Thrombosis Day., and received CPD accreditation from the Royal College of Pathologists for all HCP events.

For a second year Thrombosis UK was a partner hosting the Anticoagulation Achievement Awards, celebrated in the House of Commons as part of our World Thrombosis Day activities and showcasing effective, patient centred care across thrombosis and anticoagulation services. Models shortlisted from the awards are shared via website and e-communications, further extending the Charity's engagement to share and disseminate educational updates and resources.

A new 'VTE for beginners' programme was launched in Bristol and Birmingham as another arm of the Charity's educational programme. Attracting 130 junior doctors and nurses and allied professionals, the programme was held in collaboration with each centre's 'Grand Round' and proved both popular and successful in upskilling and extending basic awareness and education on VTE to newly qualified healthcare practitioners.

Exhibiting at the ISTH congress in Dublin, the Charity was successful in linking with research and professional bodies and individuals from across the world. Collaboration arising from this has included sharing patient information resources for translation and adaption, interest in the UK #LetsTalkClots HCP educational programme and an invitation to collaborate with a European wide Cancer Associated Thrombosis awareness initiative and an international VTE research body.

Research

Thrombosis UK has continued to facilitate, inform and participate in a wide range of VTE research projects. Update and outcomes of these are reported back to the Trustees and where possible, incorporated in future educational events and the development of new or reviewed fact sheets and resources.

The Charity also offers small Travel Fellowship Research grants and has historically partnered two other professional bodies to support a PhD Research grant.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCES

The Thrombosis UK Medical Director and Nursing Director continue to liaise with the Welsh government and NHS Wales (GIG Cymru) to maintain awareness and focus on progress in effectively implementing VTE risk assessment for all hospitalised patients.

Two Thrombosis UK medical Trustees are committee members for NICE VTE guideline update committee (NG89), published March 2018; Our CEO presented on Patient Decision Making at the annual NICE conference. The Charity continued to respond to relevant NICE and Scottish Intercollegiate Guidelines Network (SIGN) consultations.

Research

Charity representatives on research groups were extended during 2018/19 with Thrombosis UK receiving an increase in requests for involvement in participating on research committees and ensuring the patient voice was included.

Thrombosis UK has also been involved in supporting research through patient engagement, with individuals joining research guidance committees and research surveys being shared with supporters to seek their anonymous and confidential responses.

Amongst others, projects include:

The Charity launched a research fundraising initiative and extended research grant opportunities to include a 'VTE 'Masters' grant.

Fundraising

The Charity was fortunate to receive exceptional fundraising support from individuals and teams. Over 80 Just Giving pages were opened and alongside several Virgin Money Giving. Every penny really did make a difference and activities racing anything from a few pounds to over £5,000 were received. We are indebted to each and every individual.

With increased activity on awareness and engagement, donations to the Charity increased from both recurring donors and supporters along with new. Increasing awareness on Facebook with donate and fundraising options has added to this.

In 2018 the Charity launched an online e-bay shop, with the intention to

- (i) establish a new stream of unrestricted income to support the work of the charity
- (ii) extend awareness and general understanding of thrombosis to a new audience

The e-bay store attracted shoppers throughout the year and delivered a modest profit by end of year that could be reinvested to purchase a dedicated 'shop front' for greater presence and identification within the ebay site. Successfully securing further stock items the intension is to re-launch the Thrombosis UK ebay store with a dedicated 'Clotters Independent Traders' department offering an increased and broader range of sell items in 2019.

GRANT MAKING

The Charity continues to consider grants for research and travel fellowships. Grants are considered by the Trustees at their meetings and are considered on a case by case basis and awarded by unanimous approval from the Board. Travel fellowships are limited to one grant per individual every three years.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

During the year ended 31 January 2019 the Charity made a small surplus of £2,421 (2018: £4,528). There was a 4% increase in incoming resources from the 2018 level of £158,313 to £164,165 in 2019 but a slightly greater increase in expenditure from £153,875 to £161,744. Economic and political uncertainty continues to affect the ability of the Charity to meaningfully forecast corporate and individual funding commitments and, as with last year, although the Charity budgeted to meet its planned charitable activities through funds raised in the year it was prepared to have to utilise a proportion of its general unrestricted reserves if necessary.

The net assets of the Charity have been retained and have slightly increased from £282,324 in 2018 to £284,745 and this fits with the reserves policy of the Charity.

PLANS FOR FUTURE PERIODS

For 2019/20, building on the work from 2018/19, Thrombosis UK plans include:

- Extending national Thrombosis Week to cover the whole of May
- Continue to grow attendance to the series of National Thrombosis Conferences
- Respond to identified need and increase topics covered in patient information resources
- Broaden display and awareness materials made available both on line and in print
- Develop dedicated materials for specific areas of thrombosis, including cancer Associated Thrombosis and VTE Prevention
- Publish the first in a range of patient information films focused on increasing understanding of experiencing a blood clot and addressing the frequently asked questions prominent during investigation and in the first three months after diagnosis
- Broaden sponsorship support both in range of sponsors and opportunity to gain value in kind, such as training

REFERENCE AND ADMINISTRATION DETAILS:

A Board of ten Trustees, who are also Directors of the company, govern Thrombosis UK. The Trustees have the power to appoint, and remove, any member to act as Secretary to the Charity and all vote on the appointment of the Chairman, Treasurer and other Honorary Officers. The Charity seeks to ensure trustees are appointed to fulfil the changing and on-going needs of the Charity's activities and outcomes. New trustees are appointed with the unanimous approval of existing trustees.

All Trustees give freely of their time and expertise and receive no remuneration for their work as trustees. The current list of trustees, who acted throughout the period of review except where indicated, is given on page 2.

Trustees unanimously agreed to adopt a rotational model for the role of Medical Director of Thrombosis UK, with each appointee in post for two-three years. In April 2016 Professor Simon Noble accepted an invitation to this role taking up the post in June 2016, with the objective of allowing for fresh ideas to percolate through the organisation.

Face to face Trustees meetings are held a minimum of twice per year. Email correspondence is used to keep Trustees updated in between meetings and the CEO meets with Thrombosis UK's Medical Leads and /or Chair of Trustees between four-six times per year to discuss projects and agreed strategic and directional development.

TRUSTEES' RESPONSIBILITIES IN RELATION TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The trustees (who are also directors of Thrombosis UK for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the Trustees' Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

Company law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year, which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure, of the charitable company for the year.

In preparing these financial statements, the trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable UK Accounting Standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charitable company will continue in operation.

We consider the systems we have in place for the day-to-day operation of Thrombosis UK to be appropriate to our current size of operation but we are aware that as we grow we will need to develop and implement procedures and reporting regimes to mitigate the risks associated with running a charitable company.

NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 JANUARY 2019

1) Statutory Information

a) Company Status

The charity is a company limited by guarantee, incorporated in England and Wales. The registered office is First Floor, Shropshire House, 179 Tottenham Court Road London W1T 7NZ. The principal office address is PO. Box 58, Llanwrda, Carmerthenshire, SA19 0AD.

The members of the company are the trustees named on page 2. In the event of the charity being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £1 per member of the charity.

b) Charitable Status

Thrombosis UK (Formerly known as Lifeblood: The Thrombosis Charity) is a registered charity, registration number 1090540 and in consequence is exempt from taxation on income arising from and expended on its charitable activities.

2) Accounting Policies

The principal accounting policies, all of which have been applied consistently throughout the year, are set out below:

a) Basis of Preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) – (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

Thrombosis UK meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy notes.

The charity has applied Update Bulletin 1 as published on 2 February 2016 and does not include a cashflow statement on the grounds that it is applying FRS 102 Section 1A.

b) Functional and presentation currency

The company's functional and presentation currency is GBP.

c) Fixed Assets and Depreciation

Depreciation is charged on a straight-line basis, in order to write off the assets over their useful economic lives as follows:

Computer and Other Equipment over 3 years

Assets acquired under a value of £1,500 are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the year of acquisition.

d) Income and Expenditure recognition

Income is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the items of income have been met, it is probable that the income will be received, and the amount can be measured reliably.

The Charity, in common with many others of a similar size and organisation, derives a substantial proportion of its income from voluntary donations. Such donations are recognised and entered into the accounting records when they are received. Other income, such as bank interest, is accounted for on an accruals basis. All expenditure is accounted for on accruals basis.

e) Debtors and creditors receivable / payable within one year

Debtors and creditors with no stated interest rate and receivable or payable within one year are recorded at transaction price. Any losses arising from impairment are recognised in expenditure.

f) Unrestricted Fund

Unrestricted funds are donations, gifts and other incoming resources receivable or generated for the objects of the charity without further specified purpose and are available as general funds or for purposes as designated and agreed by all the Trustees.

g) Designated Fund

Designated funds (where applicable) are unrestricted funds earmarked by the Trustees for particular purposes.

h) Restricted Fund

Restricted funds are donations, gifts and other incoming resources receivable or are generated for the objects of the charity with a specified purpose. They can only be used in accordance with the donor's wish or by the terms of a public appeal.

Purpose of Restricted Funds

Research - There was a donation of £50 received towards the Thrombosis UK Research Fund in the year.

Awareness Campaign – We have received a grant of £6,000 from a grant making charity towards the funding of our Patient Focused Film project to raise awareness of issues around thrombosis care and treatment. We have also received donations totalling £3,273 towards our VTE Research Grand Appeal launched in June 2018. The remaining balance of this fund was a transfer as noted below.

Purpose of Unrestricted Funds

General funds balance includes:

- (i) General Thrombosis UK is committed to raising awareness and advancing thrombosis research in the UK. The Trustees have decided that as much as possible of the money donated by the general public will be used towards these objectives.
- (ii) Awareness Events Donations being received to enable the charity to widen the Public and Health Professionals' awareness of thrombosis and the related issues. Sponsorship fees of £24,550 were received in the year to support the National Thrombosis Week and also World Thrombosis Day.

Transfers between funds

There was a transfer of £23,023 made in the year from the unrestricted funds to the restricted fund. This related to the donor's request of the funds raised as a result of the Iron Man Challenge undertaken in 2017/18 towards the Patient Focused Film project as part of the Awareness Campaign.

13) Capital Commitments

There are no outstanding commitments as at 31 January 2019.
